He created and secured funding for the Bird Nerds afterschool club that studies birds in the classroom then identifies birds in the field.

Sarah Breznen, director of education at Woodcock Nature Center in Wilton, Connecticut, since 2009, has combined science and visual arts to develop innovative, nature-based programs that impact over 1,500 students annually across four Connecticut school districts. Many of the programs are field trips designed to meet rigorous state standards and are integral to science education objectives. Her passion for nature and love of teaching imbue her students with a deep appreciation for the environment and foster a lasting connection with the natural world.

DEBRA DAVIS-GALLIARD

After a 30-year career in the IT industry, Debra Davis-Galliard returned to school for a highereducation degree to teach chemistry and earth and general science to fifth through twelfth graders. She has helped students understand both the fragility and beauty of our environment by supporting her middle school students' efforts in Rye Harbor, New York, as part of the Billion Oyster Project to restore oyster reefs to New York Harbor. When a storm destroyed their research station, Davis-Galliard worked with her students to rebuild it.
